To My Future Granddaughters.

I am hoping that by the time you are seriously being considered or at the very least by the time you are old enough to read this and understand, this moment of which I speak will be nothing more than a glitch in our country's history, a momentary lack of moral judgment. But I fear you will have a fight on your hands to regain the rights I had been granted. Yes, I fear that for all the forward progress we have made for women's rights, we have somehow allowed for those same rights to be threatened or flat out revoked.

Somehow, and I do speak with a voice of uncertainty as I did not vote for our current president nor do I stand in favor of the man who was recently voted to sit on the Supreme Court -a position, I might add, that has the potential of lasting through the birth of your own daughter- somehow our country seems to be willing, ready, and able to cast a shadow on what it has meant to be a woman in this country. To negate and mock the pain of a woman's violation undermines the liberties and justice of being American. To overlook not one, not two, but the voices of many women who were allegedly, and yes here I will acknowledge the right to be deemed innocent until proven guilty, sexually assaulted by a man who will now make choices for you is unsettling. Shouldn't it be enough to question the integrity of someone when such allegations are made against them so many times? To contradict the initial acknowledgment of the victim's voice as being believable with the cruel and immature mockery of her testimony is simply sickening.

And yet, it is with these misgivings my heart is heavily weighed. And I do apologize, not because I failed to vote but because I couldn't vote loud enough. How did these things come to pass? I can only speculate. Our last president had skin that matched yours. In the White House lived a family that your great-great-grandmother never thought she would live to see. And though many may question some of his politics, not once could they challenge his integrity as a man, a father, a husband. Because there are some women out there who have found themselves in a place of power, but now that they too can wear pants in the Senate have forgotten who got them there in the first place. It seems that my generation was selfish in thinking, neglecting to remember that we are responsible for leaving a legacy for our future.

That's not entirely true. Those who do not have your best interest at heart have left a legacy. Their sons and grandsons will be grateful.

But why you ask? Again I speculate. They fear you. And here I speak to all daughters, regardless of race. They fear your strength and your compassion. They fear your power and your brilliance. History has demonstrated that those in power will do anything they can to retain control. We see that today.

I can only pray that you will find the strength to continue the fight for we have not stopped fighting despite the setbacks. We will find our way back. We always do. It is the many strengths of being a woman. Regardless of how long or how hard the struggle, don't let anyone undermine your strength, your beauty, your intelligence. Don't forget the power of being woman.
